am proud to present the fifth edition of the PRS Global Open abstract supplement for the American Society of Plastic Surgeons' Annual Meeting: Plastic Surgery The Meeting 2020 (Fig. 1). The year 2020 has definitely been a year that none of us will soon forget. For the first time since we've been publishing the abstracts for PSTM, I can't say that I hope to see you in person at the meeting, at the PRS Global Open booth, at ASPS Center Stage, or for the courses, journal-related events, social gatherings, or abstract presentations. But, I am very pleased that there will be a robust, exciting, and engaging PSTM held virtually, and I DO hope to see you all there. Virtual PSTM may be a silver lining for all of us: in the fall of a crazy, busy, trying year, the event will be able to connect us all in plastic surgery on a level playing field across the globe. That, as it so happens, is part of the mission and promise of PRS Global Open (Fig. 2) as well. So, it is most fitting, especially this year, that the abstracts of our first-ever virtual PSTM are gathered and published here in PRS Global Open.

The publication of our Society's abstracts and posters in PRS Global Open is significant because they are disseminated to a limitless number of interested researchers, young scientists, affiliated specialists, residents and trainees, medical students, and members of the public; open access articles are free to the end users anytime, anywhere, forever. PRS Global Open and its content is listed in PubMed Central and the exclusive Directory of Open Access Journals. It is discoverable in PubMed and is fully indexed in the Web of Science's Emerging Sources Citation Index and Elsevier's abstract and citation database Scopus. These benchmarks are a testament to the quality of the journal's content and indicative of the hard work our authors, staff, reviewers, and Editorial Board members do for the Journal every day! PRS Global Open is more searchable, discoverable, citable, and engaging than ever!

To help you better find the advances in the field of plastic surgery that matter most in the supplement, we've again arranged the abstracts by topical section: Aesthetic, Breast, Craniomaxillofacial, General Reconstruction, Hand, Migraine and Peripheral Nerve, Practice Management,

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Research & Technology, Surgical Pearls, and Posters. The open access nature of these abstracts, coupled with the user-friendly sections will allow the abstracts and posters to extend beyond the last digital session of vPSTM, and truly impact the future of our field.

These abstracts and posters represent the efforts of hundreds of plastic surgeons, researchers, residents, and teammembers from across the United States—from California, to Colorado, to North Carolina—and from around the world, including Australia, Brazil, Canada, Israel, and South Korea! They are a glimpse into the future of plastic surgery; what you're reading today could be a road map for future studies, papers, and practice-changing outcomes. This output has the potential to impact the field of plastic surgery for years to come. So, read them, discuss them, take to social media and post a short video of you discussing your favorite entries as part of the #PRSGlobalOpenUp challenge, or use "#PSTM20," "#PRSGlobalOpen," and "#PlasticSurgery" to join the plastic surgery community at large in the social media discussion. Tag PRS Global Open (Instagram: @ PRSGlobalOpen; Twitter: @PRSJournal) and the ASPS (Twitter: @ASPSMembers; Instagram: @PlasticSurgeryASPS) to join the global plastic surgery movement in improving plastic surgery patient safety, outcomes, and care one open access article, abstract, and poster at a time.

We will again be adding "Best Abstract" indicators (Fig. 3) on certain abstracts—based on your input from the annual meeting of the American Society of Plastic Surgeons. The abstracts that are chosen during the Annual Meeting by each session's moderators and raters will be labeled online to help you readily note these selected writings. That said, I encourage you to read *every* abstract that interests you.

The abstracts in this supplement are peer reviewed. These abstracts have been peer reviewed by the Annual Meeting Educational Program Committee of the ASPS' Annual Meeting Council. For Virtual PSTM 20, there were 2 tiers of abstract acceptance. Tier 1 acceptances were reserved for abstracts rated among the Top 200, based on committee review. Tier 1 and Tier 2 abstracts will be scheduled for a 5-minute On-Demand presentation during Virtual Plastic Surgery The Meeting. The Top 100 abstracts will also be

scheduled for a scheduled 5-minute presentation with live Q&A during Virtual Plastic Surgery The Meeting. Only Tier 1 abstracts are published in this *PRS Global Open* abstract supplement. Tier 2 abstracts will be published on the ASPS website after the meeting. There was no differentiation between abstract presentations during the meeting.

To the authors of all of the abstracts and posters from PSTM, you have already done the hard work: you developed the study, made your plan a reality, gathered the data, and have studied the results to make the first conclusions. I encourage you to take the next step! Write and submit a full paper based on your abstract. With this publication, I invite all abstract authors to submit these works to *Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery–Global Open* or *Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery* through Editorial Manager. This is an invitation, not a mandate. Feel free to submit your paper to any journal you so desire, but do your homework and avoid predatory journals. We look forward to reading your work soon!
