To the Editor

In the recent correspondences published in this journal, the authors looked at the emergence of community pantries in different places in the Philippines as a way to fill the gaps left behind by the government in aiding the needs of the poor. In another correspondence, they focused on the importance of the virtue of solidarity as a way to get through this pandemic, because everyone is in this crisis together despite of the status we have in life.² The way how many concerned citizens initiated community pantries shows a total expression of the virtue of solidarity.
